

Analysis of French Cultural Models under Cross Cultural Theory

-- Based on Hofstede's Theory of Cultural Dimensions

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Abstract: This article uses the Hofstede cultural model to deeply analyze the French cultural model and its causes. By exploring France's performance in five dimensions: power distance, individualism and collectivism, masculinization and feminization, uncertainty avoidance, and long-term and short-term orientation, combined with France's history, geography, society, economy, and other factors, the uniqueness and internal logic of the French cultural model are revealed. This article aims to enhance understanding of French culture and provide useful references for cross-cultural communication.

The focus of the survey and analysis was on the national differences in values exhibited by employees from different countries. In 1980, Hofstede published his monumental work *The Influence of Culture: A Cross National Comparison of Values, Behavior, Institutions, and Organizations*, which was supplemented by scholars such as Pembroke, and summarized five dimensions for measuring values, namely power distance and individualism. Collectivism, masculinization and feminization Uncertainty avoidance and long-term and short-term orientation. [1] These dimensions provide a powerful theoretical framework for us to understand and compare different cultures.

3. Analysis of French Cultural Models

“Power distance is defined as the level of expectation and acceptance of unequal distribution of power among vulnerable members within a country's institutions and organizations”. [2] In France, this index is twice that of Germany, indicating a relatively high power distance in French society.
