

# Study of the Art of Sculptural Patterns in Romantic Architectural Decoration in Nineteenth-Century Europe

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**Abstract:** This paper focuses on the art of sculpture in Romantic architectural decoration in 19th century Europe, aiming to systematically sort out its artistic characteristics and historical background, and reveal its role and value in architectural art. The study adopts literature research, image analysis and comparative research method, and finds that Romantic architecture emerged as a result of social changes such as the Industrial Revolution and nationalism, and broke the classical symmetry in style, and made a lot of use of decorative techniques such as carving. Influenced by Romanticism, the carving pattern emphasizes emotional expression and natural symbiosis, and the theme covers nature, myth, history, etc. It has the functions of decorative beautification, cultural inheritance and emotional rendering, and forms an artistic association with architectural space in defining, creating atmosphere and guiding vision. Different countries present different characteristics due to cultural differences, with France having Gothic and medieval mystical poetry, Britain embodying idyllic and national characteristics, and Germany integrating national traditional elements. Their artistic achievements are outstanding and have a profound influence on the architectural art of later generations, which is a precious heritage of European culture and art history. The study fills in the research data of related fields and provides historical reference for contemporary architectural design.

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## 1. Introduction

### 1.1. Purpose and Significance of the Study

The main purpose of this study is to systematically sort out and analyze the artistic characteristics of carved patterns in the 19th century European Romantic architectural decoration and its historical background, and to reveal its unique role and value in architectural art. former is used to fight against the classical art. There are even fewer specialized researches for its carving patterns. Therefore, this study is expected to fill in the supplement of related fields in domestic and international academic circles and contribute to the promotion of in-depth research on Romantic architectural art.

### 1.3. Research Methodology and Approach

This study will be carried out by a combination of literature research method, image analysis method and comparative research method. Firstly, through extensive review of relevant literature and materials at home and abroad, we will systematically sort out the development lineage and stylistic characteristics of Romantic architecture and its decorative arts in 19th century Europe. Secondly, the image analysis method is used to observe and categorize the carving patterns in Romantic architecture, so as to reveal their artistic styles and expressive methods. Finally, the similarities and differences of the carving patterns in Romantic architecture in different countries and regions, as well as their historical background and cultural connotations, are explored through comparative research. On this basis, this study will form a comprehensive knowledge and in-depth understanding of the art of carving patterns in 19th century European Romantic architectural decoration.

Secondly, in terms of materials, Romantic architects favored the use of natural materials, such as stone and wood, to emphasize the connection between architecture and nature. In addition, in terms of decoration, Romantic architecture made extensive use of carving, painting and other techniques to create a rich and varied artistic effect (Wang Feng, 2025). The carving patterns not only beautify the city, but also the city's interior and exterior. These carving patterns not only beautify the appearance of the building, but also carry the architect's emotional expression and symbolism.

## **2.3. The intersection of Romantic architecture with other art forms**

Romantic architecture in 19th century Europe is not only a pile of masonry and wood, but also a product of deep integration with various art forms such as painting, sculpture, literature, etc. (Guo Qing, 2015). During this period, architects were deeply influenced by Romantic literature and pursued the free expression of emotion and the infinite beauty of nature, incorporating these ideas into architectural design to create spaces that were both solemn and poetic. Romantic architecture has a close connection and intermingling with other art forms. First, Romantic architecture interacted with art forms such as painting and sculpture. Many Romantic architects were also painters or sculptors, and they incorporated their artistic ideas into their architectural designs. Secondly, Romantic architecture also shared common themes and expressions with art forms such as literature and music. For example, themes such as reverence for nature and history, and expression of individuality and emotion are reflected in both Romantic architecture and literature. This cross-art form intermingling makes Romantic architecture more colorful and expressive.

## **3. The Artistic Expression of Sculptural Patterns in 19th Century European Romantic Architecture**

### **3.1. The artistic style and characteristics of carving patterns**

The carving patterns in the 19th century European Romantic architecture show a unique artistic style and characteristics. The motifs are mostly taken from myths and legends, historical stories and natural scenery, showing the desire and pursuit of beautiful things through delicate and subtle carvings. In addition, the Romantic architectural carving pattern also pays attention to the use of color to bright, rich hues to enhance the visual impact, so that the building as a whole appears more vivid and lively. (Xiao He, 2001) These patterns not only decorate the building itself, but also give the building to the soul and emotion, making it a living work of art.

### **3.2. The Artistic Function of Carving Patterns in Architectural Decoration**

In architectural decoration, carving patterns play an important artistic function. From the point of view of decorative function, carving pattern is the architectural appearance of colorful clothes. They are either carved on the building facade, intertwined with curly grass pattern and flower pattern, giving the building delicate and soft, like the Arc de Triomphe in Paris, its exquisite relief patterns, from mythological stories to war scenes, with rich layers, greatly enhancing the visual impact of the building, becoming the focus of people's attention to the art of focusing on the building to get rid of the monotony, overflowing with artistic charm. (Chen Gao Ming, Cui Can, 2023).

Carving patterns are also silent messengers of cultural inheritance. Romantic architecture often looks back to history, and the carving patterns of Gothic, Renaissance and other styles are reinterpreted and utilized. Gothic elements such as pointed arches, flower window lattices and other carvings, convey the mystery and solemnity of the Middle Ages, evoke the memory of the past culture and respect, in the new building to continue the ancient cultural lineage, so that the tradition can be inherited and developed in the change of the times. (Liu Yishi, 2023). The function of emotional rendering should not be underestimated. Through different thematic patterns, architecture can convey various emotions. The relief of heroes inspires people's patriotic passion and national pride; the pattern symbolizing love and hope injects a warm and romantic atmosphere into the architectural space. People can deeply feel the emotional power contained in the building and trigger strong emotional resonance.

Carving patterns in the 19th century European romantic architecture, decorative beautification, heritage culture, rendering emotional multiple artistic functions, become an indispensable element of the soul of the architectural art, shaping both beauty and connotation of the architectural masterpieces for future generations to leave a valuable cultural wealth.





### **3.3. The Artistic Relationship between Sculptural Patterns and Architectural Space**

In 19th-century European Romantic architecture, sculpture

and architectural space were intimate companions, creating a unique and fascinating artistic connection. Sculpture is a subtle definer of architectural space. As shown in Table 1, in the grand church building, the complex carvings on the column heads are like an invisible dividing line of space,

separating the nave from the side aisles. These carvings not only have a decorative role, but also through the unique shape and layout, suggesting the transformation of spatial functions, guiding the path of believers' actions, so that the internal space of the building is divided into natural and orderly.

Sculptural motifs are even better at creating atmosphere. In Romantic architecture, which seeks to express emotion, specific motifs can create an atmosphere that suits the purpose of the space. In the living room of a private residence, elegant vines and birds as the theme of the carving pattern, decorated in the ceiling and walls, injected into the space of relaxation and pleasure, warm and romantic atmosphere, suitable for the needs of social gatherings. In monumental buildings, solemn reliefs of figures and geometric patterns symbolizing power create a solemn and reverent atmosphere, reinforcing the monumental significance of the space.

Carved patterns also assume the function of visual guidance, skillfully planning the direction of people's eyes in the architectural space. The continuous pattern carved along the handrails of the stairs attracts people's eyes to move from bottom to top, increasing the dynamics of the staircase space and making the vertical transportation area no longer monotonous. In the large public space of the building, the beautifully carved pattern of the central dome becomes the visual center, converging people's eyes upwards, highlighting the grandeur and openness of the space, and enhancing the depth and three-dimensional sense of space.

## 4. Artistic Interpretation of Sculptural Patterns in Romantic Architectural Decoration in Nineteenth-Century European Countries

### 4.1. The Art of Sculptural Patterns in French Romantic Architecture

In France, the carved motifs in Romantic architecture show a unique artistic charm. Influenced by Gothic and medieval art, French sculptural motifs of this period often present a mysterious and poetic atmosphere. These carving patterns not only reflect the love of British Romantic architecture for nature and national traditions, but also reflect the architect's pursuit of a harmonious symbiosis between art and nature.

### 4.3. The Art of Sculptural Patterns in German Romantic Architecture

In Germany, the carvings in Romantic architecture display a distinctive national and regional style. German carving patterns often incorporate traditional elements of the Germanic peoples, such as mythological figures, folk tales, and symbolic animal and plant motifs. These carvings not only add a mysterious and romantic atmosphere for the building, but also convey the German people's pride and respect for national history and culture through its symbolism.

### 4.4. An Overview of the Art of Sculptural Patterns in Romantic Architecture in Other Countries

In addition to France, Britain and Germany, the Romantic architecture of other European countries is also rich in the artistic expression of carving patterns. For example, in Italy, the carving pattern often shows the combination of classical and romantic characteristics, into the ancient Greek and Roman art elements; in Spain and Portugal, the carving pattern is influenced by the Gothic and Moorish art, showing a unique and diversified style. These different countries carving pattern art mutual reference, fusion, together constitute the 19th century European romanticism building decoration in carving pattern of the bright picture scroll.

Through comparative analysis, we can see from Table 1 that although the Romantic buildings in different countries

show different artistic styles and cultural characteristics in the carving patterns, they all demonstrate a deep understanding of nature, the pursuit of beauty and history and culture. These carvings not only decorate the buildings, but are also rich in symbolism, reflecting the thoughts and feelings of the artists of various countries.

Its influence on the later Art Nouveau and Gothic Revival styles is far-reaching, and it has become an important model for the emotional expression of architectural art.

The innovation of this study is that it is the first time to systematically organize this field and fill the gaps in domestic and international research on the topic of sculptural patterns. However, due to the limitation of the scope and data, some case studies and cross-regional comparisons are still insufficient. In the future, the research can focus on the deeper cultural mechanism of specific countries' patterns, combine with digital technology to carry out cross-art form comparisons, and expand the multiple perspectives of Romantic architecture, social and cultural interactions, and modern translation, so as to provide richer historical references and innovative paths for contemporary architectural decorative design.

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
